

Beavercreek Police Department Implementing “Text to 9-1-1”

Beavercreek Police Department is the first Greene County agency to begin utilizing text messaging to improve public safety. Residents can now text “9-1-1” for help, although authorities caution that this additional service is not a replacement for an actual phone call.” Text to 9-1-1 service will enable our citizens to use their mobile devices to send a text directly to our public safety dispatch center in an emergency situation,” said Beavercreek Chief of Police Dennis Evers. However, there are some important ground rules to keep in mind: keep text messages short to prevent your cell phone carrier from breaking them up; be succinct and very clear telling what the problem is and your location; and spell out words and avoid slang or emojis which can cause confusion. Chief Evers stresses that “texters” must stay engaged with the dispatcher after sending the first text message. “Current mobile device technology isn’t quite to the level where it’s guaranteed that responders will know exactly where you are. It’s vital that you’re able to tell us exactly where you are and what your emergency is so we can reach you and help you with whatever situation you’re in,” says Evers.



911 CALL IF YOU CAN
TEXT IF YOU CAN'T

“Text to 9-1-1” was developed as a way to enhance current 9-1-1 services enabling people who are hearing or speech-impaired, unable to call during a medical emergency, or who might be put in danger by being overhead calling 9-1-1 to summon help.

While this new technology is exciting, law enforcement stresses that this is not a replacement for the 9-1-1 phone call. Text messages often can be delayed through relaying cell towers or when you reach one agency but then have to be transferred to the correct agency. Even a short delay like that could mean the difference between life and death. If you attempt to send a text to 9-1-1 and are not within the jurisdictional boundaries of a dispatch center capable of receiving texts, you will receive an automatic “bounce back” message instructing you to call 9-1-1.

The “Text to 9-1-1” service is currently available to anyone with a Verizon, AT&T, Cricket, Sprint, or T-Mobile data plan.

Captain Lindsey Graduates Police Executive Leadership College (PELC)




Captain Chad Lindsey graduated from PELC Class #70 in Worthington, Ohio on Friday, November 18, 2016. Police Executive Leadership College is a series of weekly courses attended over a three (3) month period that covers twenty (20) current law enforcement topics, and consists of twenty (20) required readings, thirteen (13) journal entries, five (5) research papers, five (5) community interviews, three (3) team projects and three (3) required speeches with 105 total hours of class time. Captain Lindsey joins the ranks of over 2,000 graduates from the PELC program since its inception in 1987. PELC is administered through the Ohio Association of Chiefs of Police Law Enforcement Foundation and is designed to provide law enforcement executives with advanced level leadership training vital to enabling their organizations to meet current demands and the requirements of tomorrow. The Beavercreek Police Department has long been committed to an emphasis on and investment in advanced professional training to address the needs of our agency and community.

Captain Lindsey has worked for the Beavercreek Police Department since 2002. He holds a Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice Studies from the University of Dayton and currently serves as the Investigations Division Commander.

Beavercreek Police Hires New Officer

Police Chief Dennis Evers introduced Joel A. Schuler as the newest member of the Beavercreek Police Department before he was officially sworn in by Beavercreek Mayor Bob Stone before family, friends and colleagues on January 3, 2017.



Officer Schuler graduated from Wright State University with a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Criminal Justice and received his Basic Peace Officer Certification from Sinclair Criminal Justice Training Academy in November 2009. Prior to joining the Beavercreek Police Department, he was employed as a deputy sheriff for Montgomery County Sheriff’s Office since May 2011. He also served part-time as a Champaign County deputy sheriff between March 2010 and May 2011. Officer Schuler has held positions as a court security deputy and field training officer. He is certified in Advanced Roadside Impaired Enforcement, Police Mountain Bike Patrol and Drug Interdiction.

Officer Schuler will be assigned to a field training officer to learn Beavercreek policies and procedures. Upon successful completion of the field training shadow phase, which usually encompasses twelve weeks of training, he will be assigned to solo patrol status under the supervision of a platoon sergeant. The Beavercreek Police Department looks forward to utilizing the many strengths and talents Officer Schuler brings to the community.

This vacancy was created in October 2016 when Captain Eric Grile accepted the Deputy Chief of Police position in Hilliard, Ohio. With Officer Schuler’s appointment, the police department staffing level returns to forty eight sworn officers.

Miami Valley Crime Stoppers 2016 Student of the Year Awards

The Miami Valley Crime Stoppers Association recognized two Beavercreek High School seniors with Student of the Year Awards at its annual recognition luncheon on December 8, 2016. Skyler Coleman and Jacen Millette were nominated by Beavercreek Police School Resource Officer (SRO) Mark Brown for their outstanding contributions to their school and community. As student aides, both Skyler and Jacen assist SRO Brown with classes and building security and safety. Both are members of the Peer Listening Awareness Committee and counsel students about self-esteem, depression and suicidal tendencies. In association with Project Brite Star, the local chapter of the Yellow Ribbon Suicide Prevention Program, they both deliver presentations to Miami Valley schools raising awareness on depression and suicide. In addition to their school commitments, both Skyler and Jacen actively participate in various extracurricular athletic and community activities. With their dedication to serving as advocates for their peers, they are exemplary role models to the youth and future leaders of the Miami Valley.



Beavercreek Township Fire Department Promotes Four

Leigh Brewer was promoted from Lieutenant to Captain. Leigh began her career in 1989 with Mad River Township but shortly after was hired full time with Beavercreek Township Fire Department. She was promoted to Lieutenant in 1995.

Leigh has taught EMS classes for Sinclair Community College and Wright State University. She has been a member of the Beavercreek Township Fire Department Honor Guard, the EMS Training Division, the Fire Training Committee, Safety Committee, and the Public Information Officer and managed the fire gear program. She has led several levy campaigns in leadership roles and a grant writing team that secured a grant to replace the SCBAs in order to be compliant with NFPA standards. Leigh has coordinated a program through Local 2857 to adopt a family at Christmas every year and provide food and gifts. She has also organized an annual community drive through the fire department to collect items to send to the troops overseas. Leigh has even taught the firefighters and residents of Grand Court in Beavercreek how to make Ukrainian Easter Eggs and organized groups from the fire department to work on the Christina Youth Corp's home makeover project for the Galyon Siamese twins so they could move in with their brother in Beavercreek.

Leigh is certified as a Paramedic, Firefighter Level 2, Fire Instructor, EMS Instructor, Arson Investigator, Fire Safety Inspector, HazMat Technician, Swift Water Rescue, Rope Rescue Technician, Ice Rescue Technician, and Blue Card Incident Management Instructor. She's completed the Fire Officer 1-4 programs and has an Associates Degree in Fire and EMS Administration.

Leigh has received several awards such as 1993 Beavercreek Township Employee of the Year, Safety Committee Investigator in 2002, BTFD Outstanding Service Award and Great Miami Valley Fire and EMS Council Service Award in 2004, Chamber of Commerce Firefighter of the Year in 2010, Fire and EMS Unit Commendations in 2011, 2012 and 2013, plus a Firefighter Cross in 2013.

Christine Hawker was promoted from Lieutenant to Captain. Christine began her career as a K-8 teacher at Immaculate Conception School after graduating from Wright State University with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Education. After 10 years of teaching, Christine pursued a career in firefighting as a volunteer with Washington Township Fire Department where she served for three years. After completing Fire Level II at the top of her class she began working with Beavercreek Township Fire Department in July of 2002 as a part time firefighter and EMT. In 2005, she was hired as a career firefighter/paramedic and started her involvement in all areas of the department. Christine completed Fire Officer Classes I-IV and was promoted to Lieutenant in 2010. Most recently she completed the Ohio Fire Executive Program which is an intensive two and a half year program through the Ohio Fire Chief's Association.

Christine has managed several programs and has been involved with numerous projects and committees during her career including the GIS project, safety committee, honors committee, EMS bike team, health and wellness committee, Auxiliary liaison, CAD build/install, CAD run card development, dispatch and Pro QA, ISO grading process, street directory, resource manual, SOP manual, interoperability program, EMS proctor, infection control program, insurance committee, peer fitness trainer, union shift representative, uniform committee, Class A inspections, Fairborn joint station project, CERT instructor, explorer program instructor/advisor and honor guard.

Christine was awarded the Purple Heart in 2005 for an injury sustained while working a motor vehicle accident, the firefighter of the year ribbon and the township trustee's employee of the year award in 2005, the positive accomplishment and outstanding attitude award in 2006, a letter of commendation for her work with the SOP manual and Interoperability Program 2006, academic letter of commendation for completing fire officer I-IV in 2007, outstanding accomplishment for excellence in patient care in 2008, several EMS and fire unit commendations, assisting in the ISO grading process in 2012, and she was awarded the Meritorious Service Award in 2010 for her involvement in the health and wellness program.

Ryan Williams was promoted from Lieutenant to Captain. Ryan began the fire service as a cadet with the Fairborn Fire Department in 1996, and was hired by Mad River Township Fire and EMS Department in 1998. Ryan started in Beavercreek Township in November 2000, and worked to complete his level II firefighter, paramedic and fire safety inspector over the next two years. Ryan serves as an EMS Instructor for nearly 10 years and assisted with frequent medical instruction, protocol skills testing, implementation of cardiac alert program, the Quality Improvement project and developed the pig lab training. Ryan also reorganized the health and wellness program

and co-created a Boot Camp wellness program while also establishing gym memberships for all Township employees. After completing Fire Instructor I and II classes at the Ohio Fire Academy, Ryan was named as Beavercreek's lead Live Fire Training Instructor and has served as the Instructor in Charge for the last 8 years. Directing his career path towards technical rescue and special operations, Ryan obtained his certifications in rope rescue, confined space, trench rescue, auto extrication, machinery rescue, water rescue, ice rescue and structural collapse and now serves as lead instructor for all technical rescue disciplines. After being accepted in to Ohio Task Force 1, FEMA's Type I urban search and rescue collapse team, Ryan became a technical rescue specialist and served with the team for 7 years deploying to New York and New Jersey following Hurricane Sandy. Ryan currently serves as the Operations Chief for the Region 3 Rescue Strike Team under the Ohio Emergency Management Agency. He has received the Firefighter of the Year award, deployment recognitions, the Herman Manapace Award of Excellence, and commendations for both fire and EMS incidents. Ryan is a Fire Officer IV and a senior in his undergraduate program, working towards a Bachelor of Science in Fire Administration with a certificate in public management.

Randy Grogan was promoted from Fire Prevention Specialist to Fire Marshal. Randy moved to Beavercreek in 1991 to attend Sinclair Community College and Wright State University. In 1992, he started volunteering with the Beavercreek Township Fire Department at Station 2 as a Level 2 firefighter. He soon worked to achieve his EMT certification and began working in the Fire Department's Part-time Program. As time progressed, Randy worked in two different architectural firms and then as the Commercial Division Director of Pella Windows in Dayton.

In November of 2003, with the recommendation of Deputy Chief Ron Unangst, Randy was hired into the Fire Prevention Bureau as a part-time inspector. His background in architecture and training as a firefighter gave him the experience to seamlessly transition into the Bureau environment. Three years later, Randy was then promoted to a full-time Fire Safety Inspector for the Department. Since the promotion in 2006, Randy has been involved in a number of building projects within the Beavercreek Community and the Fire Department. Randy assisted with the construction management of Station 61; dealing with an architect that was eventually let go and an incompetent general contractor. In addition, with the assistance of his Bureau coworker Jim Hendley, he completed fire protection system inspections for both the 1st and 2nd phases of The Greene and Soin Medical Center. He has also has been involved in many other commercial and large scale residential developments in Beavercreek.

Inspection of building projects was not the only activity Randy was involved with during his work day. Randy established a Residential Knox-Box Loan Program for the elderly and/or disabled residence of the Beavercreek community. The program was established through a FEMA Fire Prevention and Safety Grant and allowed the Fire Department to purchase fifty key retention boxes to distribute. In addition, Randy contributed to the 2012 ISO study and assisted the Fairborn Fire Department with the writing of another FEMA Fire Prevention and Safety Grant to purchase a fire extinguisher trainer; a device that has subsequently been shared by both departments for at least 7 years.

Other accomplishments include being awarded Firefighter of the Year in 2003 and completing the Management of Fire Prevention Programs at the National Fire Academy in 2009. Randy is a State of Ohio Professional Firefighter, Fire Safety Inspector, and Fire Instructor. He holds a State of Ohio, Board of Building Standards, Fire Protection Inspectors Certification (which is his qualification for most of his workload) and a National Association of Fire Investigators, Certified Fire and Explosives Certification.



POLICE SERVICES IN BEAVERCREEK TOWNSHIP

Beavercreek Township Trustees authorized the formation of the Beavercreek Township Police Department in 1957. As the community grew, the department continued to add officers and provided police and fire dispatch services to the community. When the City of Beavercreek incorporated in 1980, the Beavercreek Township Police Department became the City of Beavercreek Police Department. Through a contract, Beavercreek Police Department continued to provide police services to the unincorporated area of the Township. In 2002 a 3.7 mill levy failed in the unincorporated area of the Township. Due to the failure of the levy, the City of Beavercreek Police Department could no longer provide service to the unincorporated area of the Township.

Since 2002 Beavercreek Township's police services are provided through a cost-effective contract with the Greene County Sheriff's Office. Township police services are supported by three continuing levies, two levies passed in 1976 and one levy passed in 1978. The Police Fund revenues have decreased by 37.75% due to the State Funding Cuts in 2011 and the reduction in taxable property. The Township has worked to successfully stretch these levy dollars for 38 years. The contract with the Greene County Sheriff's Office enables Township residents to benefit from the economies of scale provided by a large department, to benefit from its services and expertise, and to negotiate the level of police services that are appropriate for the community. Township residents benefit from a variety of support services and special units that smaller police departments typically can't afford. Beavercreek Township ranks lowest in per capita expenditures among communities in the area. In a comparison of four departments serving communities in the area, Beavercreek Township's per capita expenditure is \$56.78, compared to an average \$222.23.



The Beavercreek Township Sheriff's Office Substation located in the lower level of Fire Station #61, 2195 Dayton-Xenia Road, practices community-oriented policing that forges partnerships between law enforcement and businesses, residents, schools, and community organizations. These partnerships and other low-cost efforts are coordinated by the Sheriff Deputies that are assigned to the Substation. The Deputies educate residents and businesses about crime prevention and work with them to keep neighborhoods and business districts safe. The Deputies help residents who are away on vacation by conducting Vacation House Checks. City of Beavercreek Rules and Regulations

Are You Planning a Garage Sale

Garage sale signs must be placed on private property and not within road right-of-ways. Typically, the road right-of-way extends to the back of the sidewalk. In the event there is not a sidewalk, signs should be placed a minimum of 15 feet from the edge of the pavement. This distance may be greater along major roadways.

Swimming Pool Zoning Requirements

- Swimming pool installations require a zoning permit.
- Swimming pools must not be located in the front yard or closer than ten feet to any property line.
- Swimming pools must be enclosed to prevent uncontrolled access by children. Pools must be enclosed by a five foot fence or five foot solid wall with a gate and a lock. (Note: New fences and walls also require a zoning permit. A pool railing on an above-ground pool, meeting the five foot fence height requirement, may be used in lieu of a fence or wall.)
- For lots one acre or larger, enclosure requirements may be reduced if an automated pool cover is utilized in compliance with Zoning Code Section 158.121.
- Requirements for swimming pools do not apply to swimming pools with a diameter less than 12 feet or with an area less than 100 square feet.

Grass and Weed Ordinance

City of Beavercreek Code of Ordinances (Section 97.10) prohibits grass or weed growth in excess of 10 inches. Those yards that are determined by the City to have grass or weed growth exceeding 10 inches will have a placard conspicuously placed on the property.

The property owner will have 5 days to bring the yard into compliance with the grass and weed ordinance. In the event the owner does not comply, the City will have the grass and weeds cut at the owner's expense and will place a lien on the property for the amount owed.

Please remember, it is the responsibility of the property owner to maintain the grass and weeds all the way to the road pavement.
