## Preserve Street Services

**Current 2.6 Mil Levy Set to Expire in 2016**

The current 2.6 mill street levy is set to expire in 2016. To ensure continuation of this critical revenue and to generate additional funds necessary to continue meeting operational needs, the levy election is slated for March 15, 2016.

If approved, this levy will allow the Public Service Division to maintain approximately 253 centerline miles of roadway, with accompanying street lighting, signs, traffic signals, pavement markings and storm sewer systems. Additionally, the levy would provide residents and traveling public alike services such as street sweeping, pavement repairs, mowing, landscaping, ditching, and tree trimming. It is essential in maintaining the infrastructure of the City of Beaver Creek.

The levy will maintain the snow and ice treatment program that residents have come to expect, which is one of the most efficient and effective programs in the region. Furthermore, this program allows the City to meet industry standards for a critical equipment replacement program to continue service with minimum downtime. The resurfacing program and the five year capital plan will also be maintained at the current levels. The City has been very successful in securing State and Federal funding, and this levy will allow us to continue to stretch local dollars by securing those funds.

## 2015 State of the City

City Manager Michael A. Cornell delivered his ninth State of the City address for the City of Beaver Creek, December 14, 2015. The State of the City address is provided annually to update citizens on: (1) current fiscal accountability and operational and capital accomplishments of the City; (2) present the upcoming 2016 Municipal Budget; and (3) and outline future objectives for City improvements, maintain or enhance critical infrastructure and maintain or improve service delivery. *(Article continued on page 2.)*

# 2015 State of the City *(continued from page 1)*

During 2015 staff worked hard to reduce costs by; partnering with local agencies for shared services; accomplished receiving over \$4.8 million in grant money/ sponsorships; slowing future health insurance premium increases; and reducing Ohio Bureau of Workers' Compensation premiums saving through adoption of safety strategies. Throughout the City residents saw capital improvements consisting of road widenings; N. Fairfield Road resurfacing, Dayton-Xenia Road at Grange Hall Road enhancement; sewer improvements; repair and resurfacing of over 14 centerline miles of roadway, replacement of over 12,000 linear feet of curb; storm water management; roadway maintenance and much more. ## Sustain Our Street Services

It has long been the preferred choice of Beavercreek residents to fund City services through property tax levies. Levies afford the residents the opportunity to express their opinion of funding for specific purpose for a set period of time with the opportunity to reauthorize the levy at the end of its term. Consequently voters must consider reauthorize, increase existing levies, or add new levies when they are set to expire or a need arises. Issue 1 on the March 15 ballot will raise taxes \$28 per \$100,000 valuation of property and renew the existing levy.



According to the April 2015 report of Annual Local Government costs of cities and villages in Greene and Montgomery counties, Beavercreek is one of the lowest in the region. The City of Beavercreek's cost ranked 23 of 24 jurisdictions when comparing real estate taxes, school district income tax, and water and sewer rates. # Assessment to be Conducted of Beavercreek Police

The Beavercreek Police Department, accredited since 1999 by the Commission on Accredited Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA), must achieve re-accreditation every three years. For its current re-accreditation process, the police department will undergo a thorough on-site review by a team of assessors from March 13 through March 16, 2016.

## Sergeant Sumner Completes Professional Supervisor Training


Beavercreek Police Sergeant Shawn Sumner completed Professional Supervisor Training on December 16, 2015.

Professional Supervisor Training, administered through Clark State Community College, is a ten-week course with thirty hours of instruction in managerial responsibilities. It covers five basic interdependent functions: planning, organizing, staffing, directing and controlling.

This professional training is part of a continuing development program for supervisors designed to foster and enhance the proficiency of the Beavercreek Police Department management team.

Sergeant Sumner has worked for the Beavercreek Police Department since January 1992. He holds a Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice Leadership from Urbana University. He has worked various functions within the police department to include time in the Uniform Patrol and Investigations Divisions. Currently, he is assigned to the Uniform Patrol Division as a Patrol Sergeant.

## 9-Volt Battery Safety

9-volt batteries power our smoke alarms, household items and toys. They can be found in most homes. But these batteries can be a fire hazard if not stored safely or disposed of with care.

### THE PROBLEM

- 9-volt batteries can be dangerous. The positive and negative posts are close together. If a metal object touches the two posts of a 9-volt battery, it can cause a short circuit. This can make enough heat to start a fire
- It is unsafe to store 9-volt batteries in a drawer near paper clips, coins, pens, or other batteries. Do not store common household items such as steel wool, aluminum foil, and keys near 9-volt batteries. If these items touch the two posts, there is a greater risk of a fire starting.
- Weak batteries may have enough charge to cause a fire. Some fires have started in trash when 9-volt batteries were thrown away with other metal items

### STORING 9-VOLT BATTERIES

- Keep batteries in original packaging until you are ready to use them. If loose, keep the posts covered with masking, duct or electrical tape. Prevent the posts from coming in contact with metal objects
- Keep them someplace safe where they won't be tossed around
- Store batteries standing up
- 9-volt batteries should not be stored loose in a drawer
- Do not store them in containers with other batteries

### DISPOSAL

- 9-volt batteries should not be thrown away with trash. They can come in contact with other batteries or pieces of metal
- 9-volt batteries can be taken to a collection site for household hazardous waste. To be safe, cover the positive and negative posts with masking, duct, or electrical tape before getting rid of batteries
- Some states do not allow any type of battery to be disposed of with trash. Check with your city or town for the best way to get rid of batteries

### Victory & Community Parks Get Facelifts

Several renovations were accomplished to better serve the community and the many organizations that use each park. At Community Park, repairs and electrical work include power outlets into the Gazebo to meet lighting needs such as the annual Christmas lights put up by Beavercreek Girl Scout Troop 380.

Angel's Pass Memorial was cleaned and repainted and the 10 benches around the Memorial were sanded down and repainted. In 2016, we will remove and replant trees where existing dead trees pose a safety concern.

Meanwhile at Victory Park, electrical outlets were upgraded in the picnic pavilion, which enabled for the first time a Christmas lights display. A broken security lamp was also repaired to provide needed lighting in the adjacent parking lot, and construction began on The Tree House Village at Owens Place. In 2016, portions of the 20 year old split rail fencing will be removed and replaced.



## Owen's Place at Victory Park is Growing

New development is apparent when you visit the Owen's Place recreation area located adjacent to the picnic pavilion in Victory Park.

In October, a ground-breaking ceremony celebrated the start of the construction of a Tree House Village. The event was attended by leaders from the city, township, county, and state governments, as well as supporters from the local community.

The Village is the second phase of the Owen's Place master plan for creating recreational spaces and facilities that people of all ages and abilities can use together. Termed "universal access", Owen's Place hopes to establish a unique park and recreation destination in Beavercreek that appeals to people within a 100 mile radius.

The Owen's Place organization is privately operated as a 501(c)3 charity, but they have a partnership with the Park District Board to provide land access and general maintenance. Any structures and gardens as part of Owen's Place are maintained by the organization at no cost to the taxpayer.



# Street Levy: Issue 1

## *Safety and Stability for the Future*

The street levy consists of 73% of the operating funds needed to operate the department. In addition to the operational dollars, this levy funds one million (\$1,000,000) of the two million dollar resurfacing program, purchases all vehicles and equipment, procures salt for snow and ice treatment, and provides matching funds for Federal and State Grants.

If the levy fails, drastic measures will have to be taken, including but not limited to, elimination of fifty percent (50%) of the City paving program and a reduction in capital projects. There would also be a significant reduction of manpower needs for street repair, traffic control, snow and ice control and other essential services.
